#### Scholarships for promising youths

Fundación Educación was founded in Switzerland in 1994 and aims at creating new opportunities by providing scholarships to talented young people from low-income families in order for them to study at one of the leading local technical schools. In its four countries of operation, the foundation cooperates with ten such schools. Through the 'Compromiso de Honor', our scholars promise to repay part of their scholarship once they have graduated, therefore creating the opportunity for further youths to follow the same path.

The Julius Baer Foundation supports Fundación Educación by covering the costs of the scholarships for up to twenty scholars over a four-year period. The scholars supported by the Julius Baer Foundation are enrolled in vocational trainings in the fields of technology, automation, machinery maintenance and operation, business administration, and engineering, and live in Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, or Perú. The goal of the programme is to promote professional formation in fields with high employment probability and to address wealth inequality by helping underprivileged young people gain access to first-rate education and professional careers as technicians, managers, or entrepreneurs.

### Creating qualified employees boosting their countries' future

Through Fundación Educación over 810 alumni have successfully started their careers and are contributing to shape the future of their country. In total, Fundación Educación has granted over 1,000 scholarships. Its impact and efficiency are measured according to its '95%-rule':

- 96% of all scholars completed their education successfully since the start of the programme.
- 96% of all scholars found employment immediately after graduation in 2016.
- 92% of all scholars work in their home

#### Facts and figures: Latin America

Latin America is characterised by social contrasts as well as barriers to social mobility. United Nations reports tell us that 60 million people in Latin America were lifted out of poverty between 2002 and 2013. Yet, since the commodity boom ended, the poverty rate crept up from 28.2% in 2012 to 29.2% in 2015. Latin America faces high and growing youth unemployment rates with more than one in five young people unemployed or out of school. According to the Development Bank of Latin America, only 50.3% of women participate in economic activities in the region.

- The official language in all four countries is Spanish. Peru has other widely spoken native languages such as Quechua and Amara. Colombia has over 100 languages spoken in the country. El Salvador has Nahuatl and the Pipil language spoken by some minorities. Guatemala is highly diverse with 21 Mayan, one indigenous, and one Arawakan language being spoken.
- Overall unemployment rate: Colombia 9.1%, El Salvador 6.9%, Guatemala 2.6%, Peru 6.8%<sup>1</sup>
- Youth unemployment rates: Colombia 19.5%, El Salvador 14%, Guatemala 5.6%, Peru 16.3%<sup>1</sup>
- Latin America is the most urbanised continent in the world with almost 80% of its citizens living in cities
